SECTION 4.7 OTHER AGENCY PERMITS

4.7.1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this section is to provide a list and general information for the permits that may be required by agencies other than those required by these Standards. This section is a reference for permits that may be required as a result of water and sewer projects within the District's boundaries.

4.7.2 GENERAL

It is the responsibility of the user of these documents to become familiar with permit requirements in effect at the time of the application for a permit. The user should contact the specific jurisdictional agency for actual permit requirements prior to construction. Some permits may require more than 6 weeks to review and process. These guidelines may not reflect changes made by other agencies to their permit process nor conditions they may set as a part of their process. Some agencies with permitting requirements may not be included in this section.

4.7.3 PERMITS REQUIRED BY CITIES AND THE COUNTY OF SAN DIEGO

The permits described in these guidelines are general in nature and do not represent the specific definitions that may be established by the agencies listed in this section.

The following are permits that may be required by agencies listed in Section 4.7.4, CITY AND COUNTY CONTACTS:

<u>Encroachment Permit</u>: An encroachment permit is permission to have facilities occupy space in a public right of way and is typically required for any pipe, pipeline, pavement, fence, building, or any structure or object of any kind or character, which is placed in, under or over any portion of an district's property, roadway or easement. It is the responsibility of the contractor, developer, or district to obtain the permit prior to construction.

<u>Construction Permit</u>: A construction permit is permission to perform construction in a public right of way and is typically obtained before starting the construction or repair of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, commercial and residential driveways, roadway surfaces, retaining walls, culverts, street light(s) or other work of any nature in the an agencies right-of-way, property, or easement. It is the responsibility of the contractor to obtain the permit prior to construction.

<u>Right of Way (ROW) Permit</u>: A permit for authorization to use land, easement, franchise, or other interest in real property held, owned, leased or otherwise belonging to the district. It is the responsibility of the contractor, developer, or district to obtain the permit prior to construction.

<u>Grading Permit</u>: A permit to authorize the excavating, filling, stockpiling, movement of material, compaction of soil, creation of borrow pits, or combination thereof within an district's jurisdictional boundaries. It is the responsibility of the contractor to obtain the permit prior to construction. District owned projects for the storage, transmission, or treatment of water are exempt from Planning or grading permits. Other projects may be exempt if the District's Board of Directors has adopted overriding findings of a minimal project. For further information on possible exemptions, refer to Section 53096 of the California Planning, Zoning, and Development Laws.

<u>Excavation Permit</u>: A permit that is required for the purpose of excavating for installing utilities in the public right of way where excavation is required. Possible facilities include, but are not limited to: sanitary sewer, private storm drainage, domestic and irrigation water, oil and natural gas, electric power, and telephone, both main and lateral lines. It is the responsibility of the contractor to obtain the permit prior to construction.

<u>Traffic Control Permit</u>: A Traffic Control Permit is required for all public improvement projects, construction projects, and other work which encroaches into the public right-of-way including the sidewalk area. Most agencies will require traffic control plans to be submitted for review demonstrating how traffic will be managed during the construction of the project. It is the responsibility of the district, developer, or contractor to obtain the permit prior to construction.

<u>Noise Abatement Permit</u>: A noise abatement permit is required for regulating and controlling disturbing, excessive, or offensive noise during construction. Many permits are issued for construction projects during restricted time periods. It is the responsibility of the district, developer, or contractor to obtain the permit prior to construction.

4.7.5 SAN DIEGO COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY PERMITS AND AGREEMENTS

Permit and agreements issued by San Diego County Water Authority (SDCWA) are as follows:

- Encroachment Permits Property owners and developers
- Joint Use Agreements Public agencies and public utilities
- Construction Agreements 3rd parties making modifications to the facilities or concrete encasing pipelines
- Pothole License Agreements 3rd parties confirming existing top of pipe elevations
- Equestrian Trail License Property owners and developers
- Right of Entry Permits Permission to do work or cross the SDCWA right of way owners and agencies
- Parallel encroachments Only available to agencies
- Private Road Agreements Private and public

4.7.6 CALTRANS ENCROACHMENT PERMIT

A CalTrans encroachment permit must be obtained for all proposed activities for placement of encroachments within, under, or over the State highway rights of way. Some examples of work requiring an encroachment permit are: utilities, excavations, encroachment renewals, advertisements (when allowed by statute), vegetation planting or trimming, surveys, mail boxes, driveways, installation or removal of tire chains for compensation, special events, and commercial filming activities.

4.7.7 UTILITY PERMITS

Utilities such as gas, electric, telephone, and fiber optic, may require encroachment permits to cross their right of way or easements. Due to the large number of utilities that may be encountered, they have not been included in this section. Each district may have unique requirements and it is the responsibility of the user of this document to verify the conditions that each utility may have in relationship their project.

4.7.8 TRENCHING PERMITS

Permits are not issued for trenching and shoring activities, but the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal-Osha) is responsible for the oversight and safety of trenching. Cal-Osha has the regulatory authority to stop projects that do not conform to job related safety standards.

4.7.9 TUNNELING PERMITS

Permits are not issued for tunneling activities, but when the preliminary investigation of a tunnel project is conducted, the owner or district proposing the construction of the tunnel is required submit the geological information to Cal-Osha Division of Mining and Tunneling for review and classification relative to flammable gas or vapors. The preliminary classification shall be obtained from the Division prior to bidding and in all cases prior to actual underground construction.
